General Directions

East Central Community College (http://www.eccc.cc.ms.us) is located in Decatur which is on Hwy 15, 7 miles north of I-20 (exit 109) and 25 miles south of Philadelphia.

Directions to Cross Hall - East Central Community College

Approaching Decatur (heading east) from Jackson on Interstate 20

- 1. Exit I-20 onto Highway 15 using exit 109
- 2. Travel 7 miles north to Decatur
- 3. Turn left at the only traffic light and go through town. Turn right at the college sign (look for an an arch with a message board)
- 4. Go between the dormitories and turn left
- 5. Then go the end of the street and turn left. Cross Hall will be on the left. There will be a MAP sign on the door. Park in any designated parking near the building.

Approaching Decatur (heading north) from Hattiesburg on Interstate 59

- 1. Exit off I-59 onto I-20 west (towards Jackson)
- 2. Travel 22 miles. Exit I-20 onto Highway 15 using exit 109
- 3. Travel 7 miles north to Decatur
- 4. Turn left at the only traffic light and go through town. Turn right at the college sign(look for an arch with a message board)
- 5. Go between the dormitories and turn left
- 6. Then go the end of the street and turn left. Cross Hall will be on the left. There will be a MAP sign on the door. Park in any designated parking near the building.

Approaching Decatur from Tupelo (heading south) on Highway 45 Alternate

- 1. Exit off of Highway 45 Alternate onto I-20 west.
- 2. Travel west 31 miles and exit I-20 onto Highway 15 using exit 109
- 3. Travel 7 miles north to Decatur
- **4.**Turn left at the only traffic light and go through town. Turn right at the college sign (look for an arch with a message board)
- 5. Go between the dormitories and turn left
- 6. Then go the end of the street and turn left. Cross Hall will be on the left. There will be a MAP sign on the door. Park in any designated parking near the building.

President's Message




Here at the University of Mississippi the arrival of fall is heralded by festive and nattily attired crowds in "The Grove" during football weekends, by the giddy and nervous anticipation of hopeful students during "Rush Week" and by the incipient colors bursting forth on the numerous and beautiful trees that pervade the campus. The arrival of fall also is signaled by another event, namely the Fall MAP meeting. East Central Community College in Decatur has graciously agreed to host this meeting. The theme for this meeting is "MAP- Who are we and what do we do?"

This theme is in part a continuation of the challenge put forth by the past president, David Carter, in which David requested that we extend a special invitation to all teachers who have never attended a MAP meeting. That challenge is repeated since a viable organization is an organization which continues to attract new members. I think that it is imperative that we continue to keep this as one of our primary goals. The primary goals of this fall's meeting is threefold:

- Clearly define who we are and what is it we do.
- Decide on the best way of disseminating these goals. Since we are keenly interested in getting the word out to schools, one of the ideas to discuss the notion of some sort MAP 'signature event' (e.g., a demo show at a career day event) that MAP can use as a means of increasing our visibility. Intimately related is the idea that industrial ties must be established and/or maintained.
- A demonstration of of something useful to a physics teacher. The meeting will feature a demonstration of an amazing simulation program called **Interactive Physics** and how it can be applied to teaching physics on the introductory level. This presentation is part of the efforts of the educational physics group at Ole Miss and will include real demos that we have constructed to parallel the simulated phenomena and how to apply these to the class room and/or laboratory instruction.

Lastly, based upon another suggestion by my esteemed predecessor, it is requested that each member bring *one demo* to the meeting. In my capacity as laboratory physcist here, I am often called to perform physics demonstation to groups as diverse as elementrary schools, the cub scouts, and high schools. I continually amzed at how enthusiastic the young people are when they are presented with a good demo. If you have a good demo that you would like to bring and show, I am sure that your efforts will be greatly appreciated. I look forward to see you all at the meeting.
